

What if you could learn if your dog's sight is at risk with a simple screening?

One in 22 dogs suffer from Dry Eye, a condition that could lead to permanent blindness if left untreated.¹ Often, by the time a pet owner sees the signs, it might be too late to reverse damage caused to the dog's eye. There are certain popular breeds that are more prone to canine Dry Eye than others. Your dog is one of these breeds.

Ophthalmologists recommend testing predisposed breeds regularly. Dry Eye is especially common in middle/older aged dogs; dogs with diabetes, Cushing's syndrome and hypothyroidism; and, dogs with a history of treatment with certain antibiotics, eye infections or canine distemper.

A quick, 60-second Schirmer tear test can diagnose Dry Eye, which is manageable when caught early. I can help you with a management plan that can save your dog from going blind.
